Croatia – COVID - 19

- various national „crisis” ahead and during COVID pandemics (migrants, earthquakes...)

- **complex** challenge

- **regular assessment** of the effectiveness of measures taken at national level and **consideration** of the need for a shift from measures of prevention and preparedness in treating and preventing the spread of local transmission of infection, in order to strengthen health systems **response** to this public health threat

Prevention



- measures and instructions for dealing with a crisis situation (epidemic) for citizens and institutions;
- Croatian Institute for Public Health;
- activities well implemented ✓

Preparedness



- The Crisis Staff of the Ministry of Health and the Civil Protection Headquarters of Croatia were activated before the 1st national case of infected person;
- meetings on strategic level – discussion on the raising the level of preparedness of all competent authorities
- well implemented ✓

Reaction



- health-safety segment – well managed and directed;
- daily session of CP HQ – monitors the situation, adopts measures and gives instructions on the necessary actions (**strategic level**);
- on the tactical level, a certain lack of coordination, insufficient communication and action was noticed, which is all corrected and balanced over time;
- financial, economic and tourism management – challenging because sectors do not necessarily have **crisis contingency plans**

EU- COVID-19

- international organizations can provide **recommendations** (e.g. World Health Organization), other (Global Communities) have competencies to influence on **policies**
- each country has implemented the prevention, preparedness and response phase differently
- The COVID pandemic challenged mobility - at least 194 countries implemented mobility restrictions as a response to COVID-19 (IOM, 2020)



Reaction



- initial (rapid) reaction was not realized as expected;
- **challenges** in crisis management – consequently MS turned to alternative solutions;
- low level of **solidarity and cooperation between MS** – united European response needed;
- Guidelines on Measures; Communications (e.g. On the Global EU response to COVID-19); Regulations (e.g. *(EU) 2020/2094 establishing a EU Recovery Instrument to support the recovery in the aftermath of the COVID-19 crisis*) – **legislation in 21 areas** (health, economy, research, border, mobility, etc.)

Reaction towards recovery:

- Mechanism for Recovery and Resilience – the backbone of the EU's recovery plan;
- Horizon – a series of measures supporting EU-funded research and innovation in the fight against coronavirus (part of the EC action to prevent and respond to the effects of coronavirus variants);
- COVAX initiative;
- EU vaccine passport

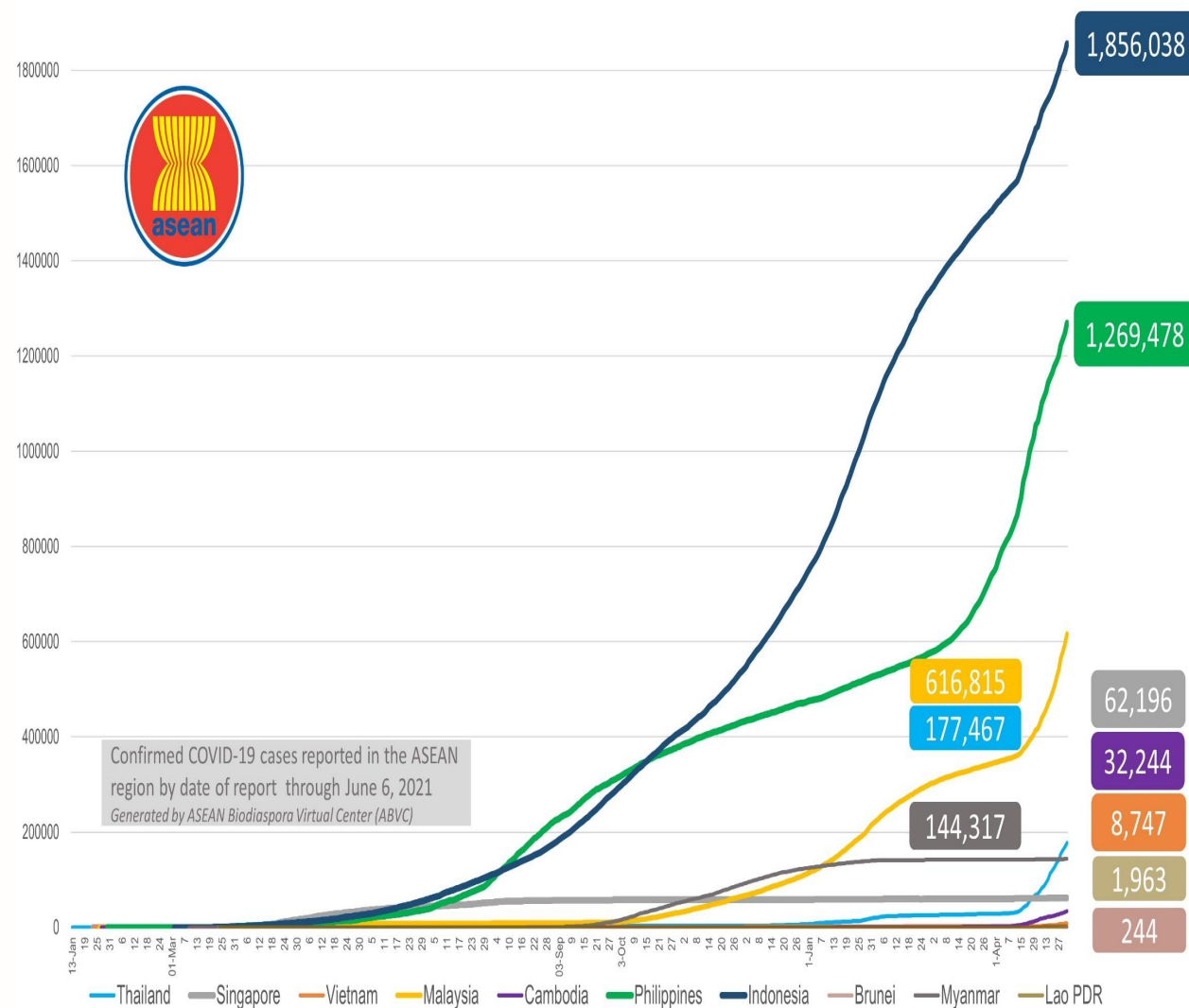

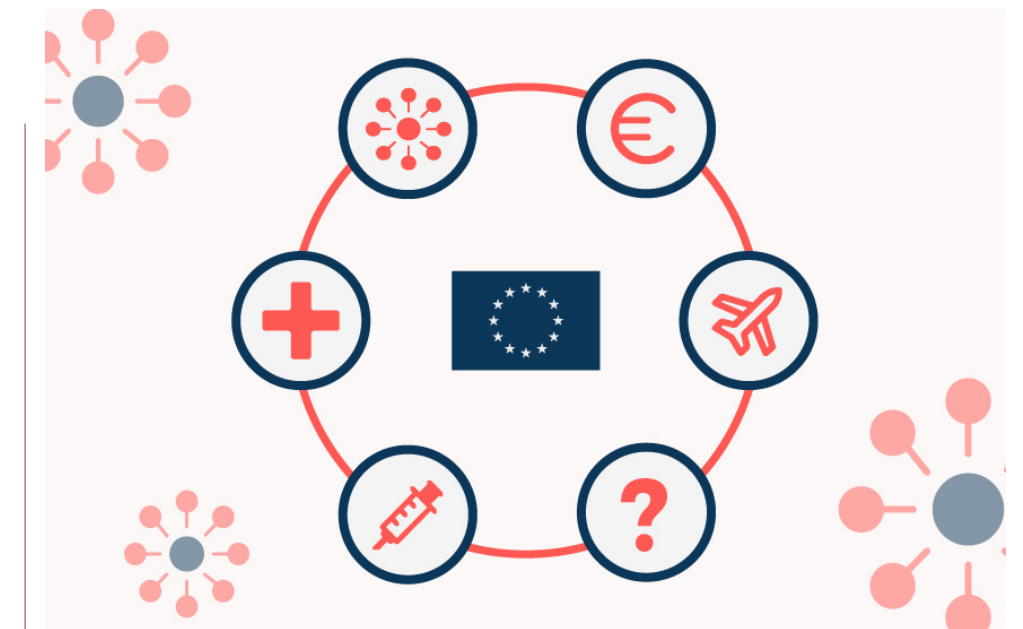
